Department of Psychology & Sociology

The Department of Psychology & Sociology offers students a solid liberal arts curriculum. In both majors, students develop an appreciation of themselves and their world through development of critical thinking, knowledge of scientific methodology and theory, and understanding of interpersonal and societal dynamics. At the undergraduate level, the department offers Bachelor of Science degrees in both Psychology and Sociology. At the graduate level the department offers a Master of Science degree in Community Counseling. *Information regarding program requirements for the M.S. in Community Counseling, application procedures, and the pre-application advisement process is available in the Graduate Bulletin or may be obtained by written request to:*

Each major will meet with a faculty advisor of the student's choice to develop academic and career goals and strategies. All majors in the department are encouraged to have an internship in an applied setting and to demonstrate competency and skills in their major as well as oral and written abilities. Students majoring in Psychology are exposed to a wide variety of specializations within the discipline. Psychology majors are encouraged to take PSYC 3070 and PSYC 3080 no later than the junior year.

GERONTOLOGY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The Gerontology Certificate Program at North Georgia College & State University is designed to enable students at the undergraduate and graduate level, non-degree students, and residents of the community to obtain a certificate in 2-3 semesters of course work. Students will complete a total of fifteen (15) semester hours of graduate level, or upper level undergraduate, courses to meet the requirements of the certificate program. Twelve (12) of the hours must come from our 4 foundational courses: Survey of Aging, Biology of Aging, Sociology of Aging, Psychology of Aging. These courses are being offered as online classes and each one will be available at least once during an academic year (Two in the fall and two in the spring semesters). Additionally, students will need to select either a supervised Pacticum Experience (GERO 3581) or participate in a Research Experience (GERO 3681) with a faculty member working in any area of Gerontology. Both the practicum and research experience must be approved by a faculty member in the Gerontology program.
